WWW Published Authors Refine Public Speaking Skills

On June 4, 2016, our newly formed Published Authors group was treated to a free public speaking program given by long-time WWW member Ronnie Hammer at the New Providence Library. Ronnie is a certified speech pathologist. Her corporation, Power Presentations, taught executives skills in public speaking for twenty-two years.

Two important principles were the focus of the presentation.

- I. Building Confidence. It's important to become your own best friend. You've done the work, put in the research and can discuss the subject better than anyone else in the room. Never feel that you might be wasting the audience's time.
- 2. Presentation. Focus on pace, tone, volume and expression. The audience should see and feel *life* in what you are saying. Use a script with numbered pages to remind you of the words you will read and *how* you wish to say them. Practice reading it, pay attention to and mark where you will pause, slow down between words, or if necessary, run words closely. Dog-ear the bottom, right corner of each page, so that you can grab and seamlessly move that page to the side to advance to the next one.

Following her presentation, members read an excerpt of their books and Ronnie provided immediate feedback. The workshop was very helpful and gave us great insights.

Both Sides Now: A Journey From Researcher to Patient — by Alice Lazzarini, PhD

I have always been frightened of birds, but take solace in knowing that even Walt Disney was fearful—of mice!

My fear is really not all that illogical because, when I was a small girl, some neighborhood boys forced me inside a chicken coop and locked the door. I was scared to death closed in that dark smelly place with chickens pecking and squawking at my intrusion!

But, I now have a newfound relationship with these feathered critters. In 1997, while on the faculty of the neurology department of Robert Wood Johnson Medical School, I was on an international team that discovered the very first mutation to cause Parkinson's disease. That discovery would completely revolutionize the course of Parkinson's research. The mutation we identified was in the gene for a protein about which we knew very little at the time—other than it was involved in learning in the songbird! Then, in an ironic twist, I developed the very disease I had researched!

The little birds on my book's cover are zebra finches, songbirds that continue to yield important clues about brain pathways that now have gone awry in my brain to cause an annoying tremor and creeping, restless legs. It is just possible that the research I did—and these little birds—will point the way to treatments that could save my life!

It is a story I've shared with persons with Parkinson's and their families throughout the country with keynote addresses at Overlook Hospital's "4th Annual Day of Hope" and the American Parkinson Disease Association's "Power Over Parkinson's Conference" in Arizona. This September I will deliver a plenary session at the 4th World Parkinson Congress (WPC) in Oregon, and my book, Both Sides Now has been chosen for presentation at the WPC's Meet and Greet with Authors session. I have blogged for Psychology Today, the Michael J. Fox Foundation, and the American Parkinson Disease Association and was the invited speaker for St. Peter's University's 65th Annual Gregor Mendel Lecture. Several newspapers and magazines have covered my unique perspective from "both sides of the white coat."

Parkinson's disease has taken the lives of too many loved ones from Pope John Paul II to Robin Williams and Muhammad Ali. My book provides a forum with which to spread a message of hope that in our lifetime we will see significant treatment breakthroughs for me and the 7 to 10 million fellow Parkies throughout the world. 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NEW BETA READERS GROUP



Many members have discussed the idea of finding readers for a finished novel beyond their own critique groups. Sometimes a fresh pair of eyes is needed to read the completed work. Members can work months or years on one project within their own groups, so to have the ability to get feedback on a completed project, would be invaluable. An objective outside voice, from a reader who will read the whole novel in a few sittings can be like a breath of fresh air.

As a result of these discussions, WWW will now be offering a new Beta Readers Group. The purpose is to provide a way for authors to get feedback on finished, longer works. The beta group will provide feedback via written comments.

The author would first complete their work, and provide a printed copy. The next step would be contacting the program administrator, who will coordinate with the author to find a beta reader for the work. The author must mail the work to the designated beta reader, who will have about a month's time to read and comment on the work. The reader will mail the piece back to the author with general comments.


