

Story Structure 101 by Sarah Ducksworth

Dr. LaJoyce Brookshire gave a wonderful workshop for WWW in New Providence on February 4th. As an ordained minister, a doctor of naturopathy, a master herbalist, and an acclaimed author, Dr. Brookshire has an interesting diverse background.

She began her career as a publicist handling such high profile entertainers as Sean 'Diddy' Combs, Aretha Franklin and The Notorious B.I.G. Following her muse, she segued into writing across genres, penning essays and novels and a memoir.

She is best known for her bestselling novel, Soul Food, which became a highly rated movie and the inspiration for a popular television series in the 90s.



The WWW members who attended The workshop came away pleased and inspired. Dr. Brookshire focused on how to shape a story and work toward never having a bad writing day.



A Presentation on Branding by Maria Dewaik



This past September, Carol Van Den Hende, a member of WWW, presented a program on branding. She explained the importance of branding and what it means to each of us in order to promote ourselves as authors. She showed us ways to "stand out in the crowd" by taking something of yourself and making it into a visual aid to help sell yourself and your books. Carol talked about archetypes and how to use that information to guide your branding decisions. She covered brand compass framework as a tool and the importance of consistency in visual branding. A Tale of Two Critiques by Lisa Napolitan

Two readers can mean two vastly different opinions. That's a wonderful thing, especially when having your work looked at by agents and editors.

At last October's conference, I submitted the same piece for critiques by a literary agent, Marisa Corvisiero, and editorial assistant, Elizabeth May. My meeting with Ms. Corvisiero was in the morning, Ms. May end of the day.

The work submitted, the opening chapter from my in-progress novel, is well, let's just say, non-traditional and so I was prepared. "Hard to sell," "too verbose," "no commercial appeal" all anticipated responses. After all, agents look at so many submissions and surely read them quickly, and my work, non-linear with long sentences and a virtually plot-less approach, was ripe for rebuke.

About agents and editors, they can surprise you. Ms. Corvisiero does receive towering stacks of submissions, but she reads closely and with great care. She took the time to understand my work, fall into its rhythm. She made suggestions that made sense to me. In other words, she "got it." She offered pitch angles and ultimately asked to see the work once completed. I walked out of that meeting with a profound sense of worth and a burning desire to finish the manuscript.

My end-of-day meeting with Ms. May was much different. "Too wordy," "confusing," "too poetic." No matter. I was still on cloud nine.

Bottom line: Believe in your work and there is an agent or editor out there who will believe in it too.
